On 29 May, 1944 eighteen Group ships dropped 45 tons of boxbs on the gen positions north of Mokmer Strip, Blak Island. Binty-five percent of the bombs fell in the target area, starting numerous fires. Heavy smoke rose to 3000 feet. Ointiment called to say, "Commanding General is highly pleased with the bombing of Goods # 2." This communication was received by the 19th Squadron shortly after passing over the target. In spite of the heavy flak and anti-aircraft fire, the bombing was excellent.

MARGATIVE HISTORY OF THE 22ND BOMBA DURING GROUP

POR THE HONTH OF HAY, 1944

The emlisted men of the 2nd Squadron officially opened their Thub with the Group Commanding Officer dropping in. The band lent an atmosphere of "jive" to the opening. Their "Club Harander" recalls to mind the B-26's that the men flew in the samply stages of the war.

The 2nd Squadron also sent home nine happy lade and the remaining ground nem are already sweating out the promotions.

On the 22nd of the routh, Lt. Plogstad and his 2nd Squadron crew were forced to land at Biak because of a gas shortage. They were acclaimed as heroes when they rejoined their friends. They had souvenirs and a rumor that Commanding Officers up there were offering Sydne; furloughs to the infantry lade in exchange for prisoners - but a decided lack of prisoners still exist.

In the 19th Squadron, Captilla Schmidt took over the command while Major Nicholson, Lt. Caster (Adjutant), and Lt. McDonough (Communications Officer) were on leave in Sydney. Captian Schmidt had flown thirty-five Liberator missions in Africa before arriving here from the States.

The officers of the 19th finally convinced Lt. Alper that he was the one who would attend the Jungle School for a course in jungle life. After he had purchased leggings, a belt and canteen, and a lot of other junk, he was told that it was a "mistake". Bow he's prowling around trying to stalk down the originator of that istrineogram.

Lt. Erben, 19th Engineering Officer, keeps everybody in the Officer's area awake with his midnight culls, and whenever the bomb-hay tanks are changed again, he screen out his hardelips.

There was a noticeable increase in the number of enlisted men in the squadron, bringing the strength to 36 below authorized strength. The increase was 41 over the previous month. Officer strength increased 14 with all attached personnel dropping 22, 3 officers and 19 enlisted men.

4. Training:

- a. During the month, all trained crews received additional training to help them maintain their high standards of performance. Bombardiers are required to drop 10 practice bombs a month in addition to their combat strikes. On these practice missions, the pilot, co-pilet, navigator, radio operator, engineer and gumners all receive training with the bombardier. In addition, Group Headquarters holds school for radio operators, both for beginners and refreshers for those with time in their duty. Pilots are given talks on subjects of interest to them. These are held from time to time as required. One on VHF (very high frequency) radio was held on the tenth to orient them with the new communication system.
- b. New areas are given therough orientation lectures on arrival by Operations, Istelligence and Communication Sections.
- c. Twice a week, Tuesdays and Fridays, a resume of the preceding week's news is given in the Enlisted Men's Day Room to supplement the Guinea Gold and other news.





- d. There are 17 complete crews, an increase of one over the previous month.
- o. Eleven B-24/s were serviceable and two unserviceable on the 31 of the month. This is an increase of two over the previous month.

NARRATIVE REPORT

It was with regret that the Squadron paid its respects to Major Rath who was transferred to Group to be a 'fateat'. But Capt. Allen will adequately replace him. Capt. Allen began his overseas duty on Nov. 1, 1943 and before his transfer to the 2nd had been in the 33rd Squadron acting and performing the duties of pilot, flight leader, and operations officer. He was assigned to the 2nd on 25 Warch 1944. Morale remained as high under him as under Major Dath.

The prime topic of conversation the first part of the month was the excellent bombing on Sarmi Point last month. The bombing was such a masterpiece that all crew members wanted photos of the bombing for their scrapbooks and albums. Although none were distributed, the copies from the Intelligence disappeared.

This month 12 completed and 1 incomplete missions were carried out. Five were to Sarmi-Wakde Area, six to Biak Island and two ground support missions. One ground support mission was incomplete due to weather. 221g tons of bombs were dropped over those targets in seventy sorties. Incomplete missions and planes which did not reach were not included. High points were the missions on 17 May and 27 May to Wakde and Biak respectively. Both strikes were successful and all crews were highly elated at being a part of the task forces that made landings at those places. At Makde the action was well cut and conservation easier that at Biak, and us a consequence when the chatter turns to landings, someone is sure to say, "Well, at Wakde it was ——". Grows on both strikes felt that they had carried out a worthwhile mission, much more so then if the same bombs had been unloaded at a target somewhere in the bush.

With the landing at Wakde and Bisk, the rumor-mongers had the squadron inactive for the next two months until fields were closer to lucrative targets. However, on the 28 May a strike was scheduled for Namber Island with other squadrons in the Group scheduled for targets even further away. Weather prevented those long range missions from being carried out.

formal opening had been held up by lack of "christening material," ever since the middle of April. The building is a log frame with a native built grass roof. The roof is the only part of the building that was not constructed by the men. The result shows that all efforts expended were the best. The shiny bar is surrounded by split banboo varnished as is the entire front. A banboo blind on the right of the bar is reised when the 'PX' is open. Chairs and tables for lounging or cards are numerous and for the arounded eights benches have been built in the corners along the sides. At the end opposite the bar, a small bundstand has been erected. Over the bandstand (as at the bar) a parachute has been stretched to add color to the room. With the supply parachutes that hang from the middle, all this makes a confortable club.

It. Gol. Robinson, the Group Commander, Capt. allen, Major Rath; opt. Rice, the Medical Officer, Lt. Hafey, it Colloran and others were sent for the occassion. Naturally a bend recupied the bandstand giving



"jive" for the party. The formal opening was a success. Photographs of the opening night are included in the original of this report.

The following Saturday another big party was held. The band, the same dignitaries and the same entertainment. But added was the broadcast, ever the Group short wave radio, of the music for the benefit of those who could not be present and had radios. The Officers Club (mile away) picked up the program and listened.





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
For meritorious achievement while participating in an abrial flight near alexishafen, New Guinea, on 7 January 1944. These crew members of a B-25 were participating in a three-plane search mission when a large Japanese submarine was sighted. Two bombing and strafing runs were made, with near misses being observed, and the vessel submarged, trailing a large oil slick. Almost immediately the submarine, apparently badly damaged, reappeared and this crew made successive strafing attacks for fifteen minutes. The vessel finally sank and its disappearance was followed by four separate oil slicks of such size that its destruction was considered certain. The courage and devotion to duty displayed on this occasion are worthy of commendation.





f. Remerks :-

On 13 May, 1944, six B-24-J's bombed installations at Sawar, dropping 21 tons of instantaneous demolition bombs in the target area. One bomb dropped hit starting 1200 feet inland, 1000 feet west of Maffin Strip to Works Piver, hitting a building on the wast shore of the Works River. Moderate first were started in the target area. Three bombs hit in the central third of Maffin Strip causing considerable damage. Due to weather over the base during takeoff, two planes, MRS and MSSS, lost the squadron formation and proceeded to the target with the 43rd Bomb Group and the 402th Bomb Squadron, respectively. Their bombing results are incorporated in the total dropped for the squadron.

On 15 May, 1944, six B-24-J's bombed installation at Sarmi, dropping 24 tons of instantaneous demolition bombs from 10,000 and 10,500 feet, hitting in the target area of the primary target. Bombs blanketed the entire SW section of the target starting at the gardens and running thru the building area. Three strings of bombs hit in the building area demolishing a number of buildings. This was reported by an Observer on this mission. The mission was highly successful, the weather was clear and favorable to and from the target. There was no interception and ack-ack was weak and far behind.

On 22 May, 1944, seven B-24-J's bonded installations at Biak, dropping 13 tons of instantaneous demolition bombs between 1140/K and 1141/K from 11,500 feat. The bonds blanketed the entire eastern half of the target

Area; no observed results were reported other than bomb bursts. One of our aircraft flying this mission with the SErd Bombardsent Squadron started a small fire in the target area covered by that unit. There was no enemy fighter interception. On this mission anti-circraft fire was of heavy calibre, moderate to intensity. It was accurate for altitude but very inaccurate for tracking, bursting to the right and behind. Sedium bursts came from the north of Mokker Strip.

On 29 may, 1944, six type B-24-J's of this squadron conducted a strike against defense area north of 50 at siak. Take off was at USUO/R and the aircraft appeared over the target at 1104/A. The bombs blanketed the entire target area, causing smoke to rise to 5000 feet visible for 50 miles from 11,000 feet. "Dintment" called to say "Commanding General is highly pleased with the combing of Goods #8". This commendation was received by Goods #2 (19th formardment equadron) shortly after passing over the target. The Commanding General, Advance Echelon, Fifth Air Force, AFO 715, Unit 1, also issued an commendation handed down from the CO, Fifth Air Force, AFO 925:







12. Marrative Reports

The month of May was a comparatively quiet one, in the history of the 408th. With the Japa pushed almost out of reach, the air action has been somewist routine, weather diving the boys more trouble than the little sons of _____, but, well, you'll find the combat facts in the statistical data proceeding this narrative.

There was one unusual incident in the air though, that morits more than just a few words; it happened on the 29th. Lt. Stevens, on his way to the target that day, "lost" two generators on take-off, but he decided to complete the mission. Pive minutes a ter he lost the third and staged with the formation. Fifteen minutes later, as fentastic as it might sound. the fourth and last concretor failed, but Lt Stevens stayed on course, deciding to use his "putt-putt" in an effort to complete the mission. This unit is an auxiliary power unit normally used to keep batteries up while the airplane is being operated on the ground or when your engines are running below 1800 RFs. The fuel that's used to operate a "putt-putt" is a mixture of mas and oil, like the combination that's used in an outboard motor, and the fuel tank has a capacity of one callon; a callon will keep the unit going about an hour. Lt Stevens wasn't carrying a reserve of this mixture, but S/Sgt John Tartat, Engineer on the ship, had decided that he could got the right mixture by draining 100 octane as from an outlet in the bomb bay and getting his oil, (hydraulic fluid) from the hydraulic reservoir. The "putt-putt" kept right on going when this rake shift fluid was tried so Lt Stevens kept right on going, determined to get to the target. He got to a point about 40 miles southeast of Howak and had two turbes go bad and "thats all, brother" -- it was time to go back home. And home to Madzab he went on about four fuel refills of the "putt-putt". Thats the closest thing to flying a "24" on an outboard motor, that this writer has ever heard of .

The enlisted mon in this squadron got a "break" when It Clark, (Navigator, Intelligence Officer, So-Getter) was assigned the additional cuty of Squadron Special Services Officer. He was off to a flying start. He felt that the men needed a club and, well, the boys have a club and it's a beaut". Clark wasted no time, asked the boys if they'd put some effort into it, if he got the materials—got a loud "yes"—proceeded to get those materials and "Clark does it again".

"Mater" played unusual tricks on some of the fellows in this outfit during the north of May. Bomber Command ordered a ship sent to Milne May on the / If for the purpose of retting two Signal Corps non down there in an effort to pick up some equipment. The 405th got the job and Captain Cole took the ship down figuring that he'd be tack that evening or the next day at the very latest. Upon arrival at Milne May, we found that the Signal Corps equipment we were looking for was already on it's way to Madab by boat so we decided to "rack off" a few things for the 405th. Lt Clark was along, by the way, so the trip definitely was not a "dry run". It was too late to start back that evening so we planned on jotting off the first thing in the sorning. But, it started to rain that night and it was coming down in torrents when norming came. The weather was had "all the way up", we found on inquiry at the control tower. That day passed (and it was still raining)—so did the mat and—well, to make the story short,



change of elothing, (the roads to QM were washed out) no tooth brush— no drathing infact. Came the sixth day and the weather cleared, but we forgot to tell you that during the second day after our arrival an engine were up revealed the emplement information that a supercharger was "out" of commission. We had quite a load including a good number of passengers so the Captain decided not to take off without the supercharger in working order. A message had been sent to the 27th Air Depot at Horosby requesting the part but no action was received. A message to Capt Copsey, the Operations Officer of the 408th get results and the part was brought to us on the eight day of the "overnight trip". We get back, dirty, tired, and weary of Milne Bay to find curselves getting the "ol' prod" about drinking look of beer, seeing plenty of women and generally having one hellows good time. The boys don't know how good Madzab looked the day we finally get "home".

Nater had played a second trick, we found, after two Officers and a couple Enlisted Non had been AWOL for about 24 hours. These adventurers were taking a cruise down the Markian River one day long bout the middle of the month, when the raft hit a rock and become just plain logs again—on the wrong side of the river. Vain attempts were made to find a way of jetting across and while the boys were still desperately attempting to find an anguer to their problem, the dark of night halted operations, until the welcome warmth and light of the next norming permitted the boys to continue same. A couple hours of looking for shallow water or a deserted raft or beat man found them still in the same sad plight, so one of the Officers decided to wrin the river and find help. He got it in the form of a boat and returned for the rest of the man. It was a rough night they all agreed; it rained all night and it's net too combertable trying to get sleep under those conditions without a bunk, or even a blanket, or a roof.

However remore had us "bussin" this menth. Bember Command "papertested" three plans which necessitated collection and transmittal of all the
logistacal data of the squadron and it really kept the section heads busy.
The anticipation of a move spurred the boys into high gear in their efforts
to get latrines pre-fabricated and similar necessaries ready for the new
station. The "move talk" died down, however and it seems as though everything is indefinite again but we can say that this particular rumor was to
our advantage. It did put us, "on the ball" and we're better prepared now
than we would formerly have, in the event of a sudden order to pack up and go.

The Rotation System of returning mon to the United States, gave us a quote of nine (9) mon for May, but the last day of the month found them still "sweating" the order to "shove off".

We're all anxiously awaiting the return of Capt Groce with the now squadron emblons. We've ordered 180 of them and from the way the sample drew approval, 180 won't last long. Every man in the squadron will want one for his jacket, but some of them will just have to wait til we can get our next order in. Here is an idea of what it looks like:
